

Mrs. O. F. Broman Dies in Denver

Mrs. Charlotte J. Broman, 75, of 1858 Glenboa street, Denver, wife of the late Dr. O. F. Broman, prominent Greeley physician and surgeon, died at St. Joseph's hospital early Monday morning.

In August Mrs. Broman fell and fractured her pelvic girdle. It had healed nicely and she was able to be up and out again. Last Tuesday she went to St. Joseph's hospital for laboratory tests, slipped on a step and fell, breaking her hip. She failed to rally following an operation to set the bone Saturday.

Mrs. Broman was born in Sweden, but came to the United States when she was a year old. She lived in the east and was married to Dr. Broman in 1899 in Michigan. In 1901 the couple came to Greeley where they made a wide circle of friends. Dr. Broman practiced medicine here until his death in September, 1917.

The family lived at 1603 Eleventh avenue from 1914 until in February, this year, when Mrs. Broman sold that property to Dr. W. J. Hinkleman and moved, with her daughter, to Denver.

In Greeley, Mrs. Broman was active in the First Presbyterian church, teaching a Sunday school class and holding membership in the Women's Missionary Society, Alpha Missionary Society, and Division Two. She held numerous offices in those organizations. She was also a member of Social Science Circle and Garden City chapter, Order of Eastern Star.

Survivors include three children, Paul H. Broman, of Denver, employed by the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company; Francis F. Broman of Denver, an employe of the federal civil service commission; and Ethel A. C. Broman, a psychiatrist with the child welfare department of the city of Denver. There are five grandchildren, Russell, Ronald and Richard Broman and Betty Ann and Charlotte Jean Broman, all of Denver.

Two funeral services are planned for Wednesday. One will be held from the Olinger mortuary, Sixteenth and Speer, at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning. The second will be from Maps drawing room at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, with interment at Lawn Grove.
