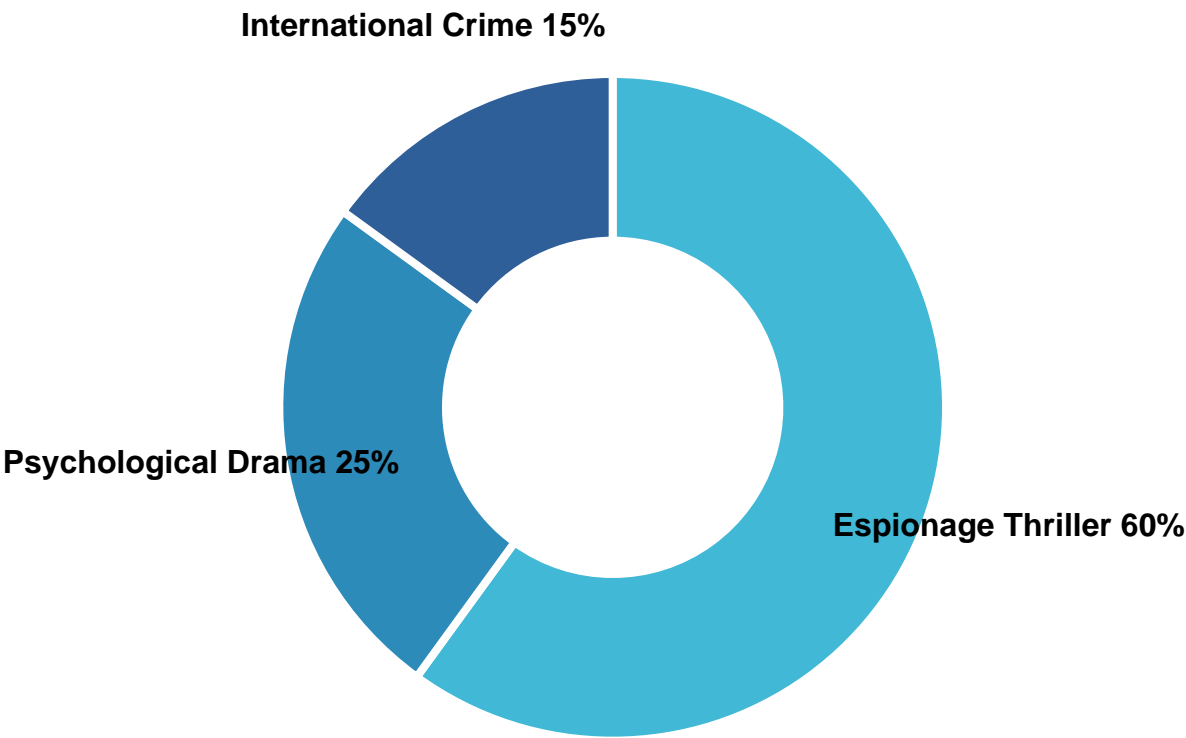

3. ThrillerFest (International Thriller Writers Awards)

Recommended Category: Best Hardcover Novel

Typical Deadline: Submissions usually run from August to October.

Why This Fits: This is the premier award in the thriller genre. While highly competitive, the book's authentic espionage elements, global scale, and Mossad protagonist make it a credible entry that will be respected by genre insiders.

Requirements: Must be a member of ITW. Published by an ITW-approved publisher within the eligibility period.

4. National Indie Excellence Awards (NIEA)

Recommended Category: Political Thriller OR Espionage

Typical Deadline: Submissions deadline is typically the end of March.

Why This Fits: Recognizes a broad range of indie books for overall excellence. The strong geopolitical plot involving Iran, North Korea, and Russia makes it a perfect fit for the 'Political Thriller' or 'Espionage' categories.

Requirements: Book published in the last three years. Requires entry fee and submission of copies.

Timely Angles & News Hooks

Leverage these current trends and conversations to position your book as relevant and essential reading.

1. The Weaponization of Trauma in Modern Espionage

Write a guest post or op-ed connecting Houri's journey—where her trauma becomes both a vulnerability and a source of strength—to discussions about the psychological profiles of modern intelligence operatives. Pitch this to outlets like 'The Cipher Brief' or 'War on the Rocks'.

Best Timing: Evergreen, but especially potent during discussions of mental health in high-stress professions.

2. Geopolitical Chess: Fictional Thrillers as a Lens on Real-World Tensions

When news breaks about Iran's nuclear program, North Korean missile tests, or Russian intelligence operations, use social media (especially Twitter) to post threads comparing the events to the plot of "Me Boy". This positions you as a thoughtful observer and draws in the 'International Espionage Aficionado' audience.

Best Timing: Reactive to the global news cycle.

3. Beyond the 'Strong Female Character': The Rise of the Morally Complex, Traumatized Heroine

Pitch interviews or articles to feminist literary publications (like Electric Literature, The Rumpus) arguing that characters like Houri represent a necessary evolution from one-dimensional 'strong' women to complex, angry, and realistic survivors. Reference your **Themes and Tropes** section.

Best Timing: Align with releases of major films/books featuring similar protagonists or during International Women's Month (March).

4. The Intersection of Sex Trafficking and National Security

The subplot involving Naomi's Delight and Yavari's snuff films is incredibly dark but relevant. Pitch a piece to long-form journalism or true crime sites about how criminal underworlds are exploited by intelligence agencies for covert operations, using "Me Boy" as a fictional case study.

Best Timing: When trafficking or dark web crimes are in the news.
