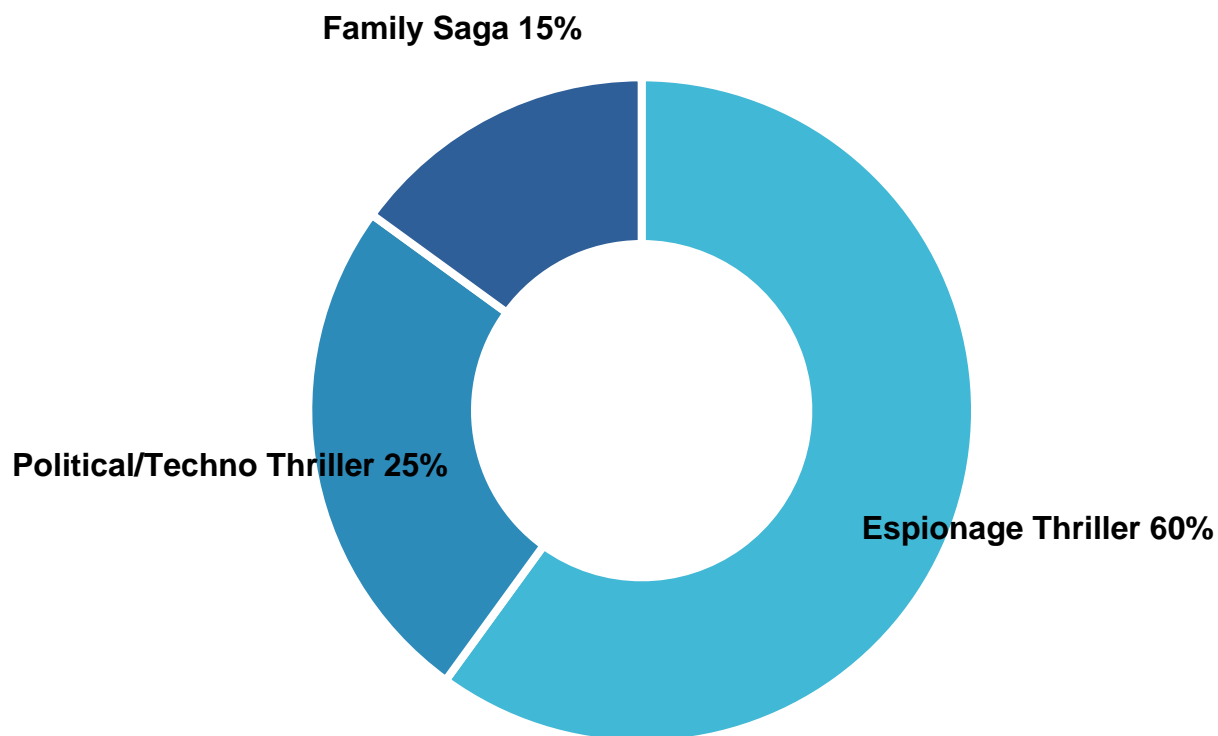

1. Foreword INDIES Book of the Year Awards

Best Timing: During news cycles about space exploration, satellite launches, or GPS vulnerabilities.

4. The Psychology of Radicalization

Use Carl Mischler's character arc from an idealistic lawyer to an insurgent leader to discuss the real-world themes of government betrayal, family trauma, and the path to extremism. This provides a deep, character-driven hook for interviews and articles focused on psychology and current events.

Best Timing: Relevant during discussions of domestic extremism or political polarization.
